VOLUNTEER FOR YOUR LOCAL FIRE COMPANY TODAY

Volunteer firefighters are the <u>backbone of our community</u>. They provide a vital service each and everyday to all of our residents and to make these fine organizations stronger, they need your service now more than ever.

Volunteer firefighting is a very rewarding and valuable way to serve your community. It takes dedication and many hours of training to become a firefighter. If you're willing to put in the time and effort, there is a department ready for you to serve. Below you'll find resources and frequently asked questions about becoming a volunteer:



What qualifications do I need to become a volunteer firefighter?

This varies greatly from department to department. All departments have a minimum age requirement, though some allow younger members to enroll as 'explorers' or junior volunteer firefighters. Most departments also have a physical testing requirement. Testing procedures vary.

What is the first step to volunteering?

Contact your local fire department and express your interest in joining. Search the internet for your local department's name — they may have a website with useful information.

Do volunteer firefighters get paid?

Volunteer firefighters do not get paid, but they can get reimbursed. Reimbursement is usually a small amount of taxfree money for time spent on shifts, responding to calls and training. The amount is usually at the discretion of the department.

Should I start physical training before applying to volunteer?

Yes, a training program will likely help you achieve the physical standards required by your department. Contact your local department for a recommended list of exercises.

Can a volunteer position lead to a career in firefighting?

Yes. Volunteering is one of the best ways to get the necessary training and experience to be an attractive candidate for a career firefighting position.

Can I become a volunteer EMT at my local fire department?

Maybe — some departments have volunteer EMS programs to supplement their public services. Contact your local department to find out more.

How many hours do volunteer firefighters work?

Many departments require a minimum number of volunteer hours per month. Ask whether your local fire department has minimum participation requirements.

BULK CLEAN UP IN MAY

The annual Deerpark Bulk Clean Up Month program will be held for town residents and businesses during month of May. All town residents and businesses are entitled to one permit each allowing you to bring up to 4 cubic yards of garbage to the Port Jervis Transfer Station at no cost (dump truck load). Certain items are restricted such as leaves, electronics, paint cans, oils, and monitors. NEW ZONING PASSED

The Deerpark Town Board unanimously passed Local Law #1 of 2013 which makes various changes to the town's zoning. The board has been working on the zoning changes since November of last year and has also held two public hearings on the proposal. The major points of the zoning changes were to make many special uses into permitted uses in business zones to help attract new business and expansion of business into the town. In addition, the Hamlet-Mixed Use districts (HMU) along Route 209, Route 211 and Route 6 have been expanded on the zoning map to allow more options for property owners to market their properties to potential business opportunities.

The board had previously made changes to their Interchange Business (IB) district, located off of Exit 1 on Route 84, two years ago, which helped to attract Planet Fitness, a new retail outlet center named "The HUB", and Alpin Haus, the new RV/Boat Superstore located on Route 6.

One of the major priorities of my administration was to make our town's zoning more business friendly which will help to attract positive rateables and stabilizing our residential tax base. It's sad to go down Route 209 and see empty shells of buildings which used to house great businesses such as restaurants and hardware stores. I am happy to say the town is now open for business and we hope that these changes are the first step to attract new business opportunities which will benefit our residents in many ways!

The town will be working on other ideas for business marketing incentives in the coming months to help spur economic growth and create job opportunities and other conveniences for town residents in future years.

NEW TAX INCENTIVE FOR RESIDENTS PROPOSED

The "Reinvest in Deerpark Home Improvement Exemption" will be introduced for consideration in the month of May. A Public Hearing will be held on the proposed local law on Monday, May 13th at 7:30 PM at Town Hall.

The proposed local law permits homeowners to apply for a partial exemption from increased taxation and special ad valorem levies, for a period of time, due to reconstruction, alterations, or improvements to their homes under certain conditions.

CUDDEBACKVILLE 209 BRIDGE REPLACEMENT

The NYS Department of Transportation has worked diligently to complete the new Cuddebackville 209 Bridge project. The new bridge was completed a few months ago and they are now currently making improvements to Route 209, Prospect Hill Road, Third Street, Hoag Road and Galley Hill Roads. An anticipated completion date in will be this summer.

DEERPARK WELCOMES ALPIN HAUS

A ribbon cutting ceremony was held to recognize the opening of Alpin Haus in the Town of Deerpark. Alpin Haus is one of the Northeast's largest, family-owned outdoor recreation retailers. They have opened a six-acre RV store in the Town of Deerpark off of Interstate 84's Exit 1, located at 36 Route 6. Port Jervis, NY.

The new location will offer towable RVs, four indoor service bays, and a full line of RV parts and accessories under the Priority RV banner, a nationwide network highly regarded for its uniform level of service and dependability.

This store is Alpin Haus' third RV location, joining those in Amsterdam and Saratoga. As many as 20 new employees will be hired to staff the Deerpark RV store.

The opening of this new location in our Interchange Business district is a further advancement of our town's plans for economic development and job creation.

PARK IMPROVEMENTS

Much progress has been made with improvements to Harriet Space Park located off of Route 209 in Huguenot. Last year, the Town Board authorized reserve parkland money to construct a football/soccer field with an additional practice field, upgrades to the baseball fields, football scoreboards, new movable bleachers and the construction of a concession stand. These projects have been completed and the park is now fully operational and being used by The Port Jervis Youth Football League and Port Jervis Little League. A new baseball scoreboard, an expanded parking area, new dug outs for the first baseball field, and additional picnic tables for the pavilion are planned as well.

Many of the local youth sports organizations have been without a home in Deerpark for many years, although there are a large contingent of residents that participate. These improvements have allowed them to return back to the town and expand their programs.

Additionally, the pocket park located in Deerpark Manor was renamed and rededicated as the Sheriff H. Frank Bigger Memorial Park in memory of the late Orange County Sheriff who lived in that neighborhood. A swing was installed and the basketball court was resurfaced last season by the town's highway department. Improvements which include a new slide, park bench, and picnic table are planned to be installed this year.

We are still waiting to hear back from Orange County on a potential grant from Senator Bonacio's office that would pay for improvements to Sparrowbush Firemen's Park located on Main Street. If we are successful in obtaining the grant, plans are in the works to improve the walking trail and install a new bathroom for park visitors.

We have also met with our insurance company to make sure all of our parks are in compliance which will help in reducing potential liability. These are huge improvements to these beautiful recreational areas and we hope that it improves the quality of life for our residents now and into the future.
